

Great American Outdoors Act
National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund



The Great American Outdoors Act National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund (GAOA LRF) is a commitment to protecting and sustaining our public lands.

Established on August 4, 2020, GAOA LRF allocates over \$1.6 billion annually from fiscal years (FY) 2021 through 2025 to the Department of the Interior (Interior) to address priority deferred maintenance and repair needs on public lands and Bureau of Indian Education-funded schools. With all five years of GAOA LRF funding, Interior bureaus will:

- Fund 396 projects across 50 states, the District of Columbia, and multiple territories
- Address over \$5.9 billion in deferred maintenance and repair
- Improve the condition of over 3,800 Interior assets

# **Deferred Maintenance** and Repair in Vermont

In Vermont, the total deferred maintenance and repair (DM&R) backlog for the four Interior GAOA LRF bureaus is \$19,189,000\*\*.

## **GAOA LRF in Vermont**

With the full five years of funding, GAOA LRF will invest nearly **\$6.8** million towards improving approximately **4** assets across **3** projects in Vermont.

### Rehabilitation of the Multipurpose Administration and Visitor Facility

Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge



Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge is a Wetland of International Importance with over 200 species of birds. The Administration and Visitor Contact facility at the refuge was constructed in 2006 and has suffered exterior deterioration due to the cold climate. This project renovates and weatherizes the exterior of the facility by repairing or replacing wood beams, trim, siding, windows, and doors. The project should save energy costs and protect the integrity of this structure, benefitting visitors and staff for years to come.

#### **Rehabilitation of Infrastructure and Public Use Facilities**

Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge

The Nulhegan Basin Division of the Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge is a designated Important Bird Area that is open to the public for wildlife viewing, fishing, and environmental education. The auto tour route at the refuge has failing components and requires frequent closure for maintenance and repairs. This project will replace a bridge along the route to provide safe and effective public access. This project will also repair the Visitor Contact Station's roof, which cannot safely handle winter weather conditions.

#### **Maintenance Action Teams**

Nulhegan Basin Division of the Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge

GAOA LRF is funding Maintenance Action Teams (MATs) in the National Park Service and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. MATs primarily consist of federal employees who mobilize regionally to work on smaller scope construction, demolition, rehabilitation, or preservation activities. As of September 2023, a MAT has completed work at the Nulhegan Basin Division of the Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge.

At the Nulhegan Basin Division of the Silvio O. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge, MATs performed repairs on the visitor center.
